COSAFA TOURNAMENT HISTORY



THE COSAFA CUP IN NUMBERS

1 – Namibia's triumph at the 2015 COSAFA Cup was **their first in the competition** and made them just the fifth country to lift the title in all. They also had a 'first' in 2016 when they hosted the tournament for the first time.

1 – The South African coastal city of **Durban will play host to the COSAFA Cup for the first time**, with the eThekweni Municipality using their world-class facilities to stage the competition. South Africa have hosted four of the last five COSAFA Cup tournaments.

1 – East Africa guest nation **Uganda will be appearing in their first COSAFA Cup**, but they have played in the region's Women's Championship (2018) and Men's Under-20 (2017) in the recent past.

5 – The number of Southern African **sides that will use the 2019 COSAFA Cup as preparation for the Africa Cup of Nations** finals in Egypt – Angola, Namibia, South Africa, Zimbabwe. Madagascar opted not to compete this year.

5 – The disproportionately **high number of own goals scored in Malawi's favour** in their COSAFA Cup history, three times by Angola (Moises, Fernando & Ito), once by Zimbabwe (Nyamupanedengu) and once by Namibia (Tjihero).

6 – The number of titles **won by Zimbabwe** after their back-to-back triumphs in 2017 and 2018, when they defeated Zambia in the final on both occasions (3-1 and 4-2). Zambia and South Africa have four wins each, Angola three and Namibia that single triumph.

6 – Aside from their four tournament wins, **Zambia have also finished runners-up on six occasions**, more than any other nation. Four of those runners-up medals came between 2004 and 2009, before they also picked up a silver medal in 2017 and 2018. They will be desperate to go one better in Durban this year!

6 – The number of **goals scored by Zimbabwe forward Ovidy Karuru** at the 2017 COSAFA Cup, which saw him finish as top-scorer and also claim the record for the most goals in a single tournament.

7 – The **Seychelles stunned Mauritius 7-0** in the 2008 COSAFA Cup, which remains to this day the biggest ever margin of victory in the competition. It also remains the only ever victory for the island nation in the competition, having played 22 games so far.

7 – The iconic Moses Mabhida Stadium, the scene for this year's COSAFA Cup final, **staged seven matches during the 2010 FIFA World Cup**, including the semifinal between Spain and Germany.

9 – The Comoros Islands have featured in just three COSAFA Cup tournaments, in 2008, 2009 and 2018. In that time **they have played nine matches**, with one victory, two draws and six defeats. Their only win was 2-1 against Seychelles in 2009, while the islanders are also the only team they have ever scored against at the COSAFA Cup!

9 – The number of **nations that appeared in the first ever COSAFA Cup**. There will be 14 at this year's event in Durban.

12 – The number of **matches it took before Zambia finally lost a COSAFA Cup match**. The team won the first two competitions were eventually beaten 1-0 by Angola in 1999.

15 – The **age of Angolan goalkeeper Eduardo Bunga** when he played in the 2016 COSAFA Cup!

34 – The number of **wins managed by Zimbabwe in their COSAFA Cup history**, more than any other country.

55 – The **number of matches played by Zimbabwe** in the history of the COSAFA Cup, the most by any side.

99 – The number of **goals scored by Zimbabwe** in the history of the COSAFA Cup, the most by any side.

1997 – The first **year the tournament was staged**, with Zambia ending as inaugural winners.

2000 – Lesotho made the **final of the COSAFA Cup in 2000**, but lost both legs of the decider 3-0 to Zimbabwe to go down 6-0 on aggregate. That is their only final appearance to date.

2008 – The year South Africa completed a rare feat – **winning back-to-back COSAFA Cup titles**. Only inaugural winners Zambia (1997 & 1998) and current holders Zimbabwe (2017 & 2018) have managed to do the same.

RECORD OF COSAFA CUP TEAMS IN DURBAN

South Africa have played plenty of internationals in Durban since their readmission to international football in 1992, but for many of the teams at the 2019 COSAFA Cup, it will not be their first visit to the coastal city either.

BOTSWANA

The Zebras have played twice before in Durban but ended up on the losing side on both occasions.

The first was a friendly international in January 2008 that was won 2-1 by Bafana Bafana, before the teams clashed again in a 2014 World Cup qualifier that saw them home side triumph 4-1.

MALAWI

The Flames have played in Durban on three previous occasions, falling short in each encounter against South Africa.

They lost a 2002 World Cup qualifier 2-0 with a game that was played at the King's Park Rugby Stadium, before a 1-0 loss in the 2002 COSAFA Cup final, second leg at the same venue when Bafana Bafana were crowned champions.

Malawi returned for a friendly at the Moses Mabhida Stadium in 2012 and lost that 3-1.

MAURITIUS

The island nation have been to Durban just once and lost a 2000 Africa Cup of Nations qualifier 2-0 to Bafana Bafana, with Thabo Mngomeni and Benni McCarthy on target for the home side.

MOZAMBIQUE

The Mambas felt the bite of Bafana Bafana as they went down 2-0 in a friendly international played in January 2008, just before the Africa Cup of Nations that year. Sibusiso Zuma and Lerato Chabangu were on target for the home side.

NAMIBIA

Namibia are the only COSAFA side to leave Durban without a defeat to Bafana Bafana when they played to a 1-1 draw in March 2010.

Rudolph Bester put Namibia ahead just before halftime but Katlego Mphela equalised for the home team.

ZAMBIA

Zambia have played in Durban once before, but never against Bafana Bafana. Their match was a 1996 Africa Cup of Nations semi-final where they lost 4-2 to Tunisia at the King's Park.

ZIMBABWE

Zimbabwe arrived for a friendly international in January 2010 and were defeated 3-0 by a Bafana Bafana side on their way to the World Cup on home soil a few months later.

It took almost a decade of competition before The Zebras made a breakthrough, but the side reached the semifinals of the COSAFA Cup in 2006 and repeated the feat the next year. The closest that have come to lifting the trophy was in Namibia in 2016 when they made it all the way to the final, but lost a five-goal thriller 3–2 to South Africa.

HISTORY SUMMARY

The Comoros are the newest members of COSAFA and made their debut in the 2008 COSAFA Cup in South Africa.

The Comoros collected their first ever win in the COSAFA Cup after victory over Seychelles in the 2009 tournament in Zimbabwe, their second appearance at the regional showpiece.

They performed admirably in that event, also securing a draw against Botswana, but a 3–0 loss to Swaziland meant they bowed out in the first round.

It was an improvement on their first showing in 2008 when they lost all three games without scoring a goal.

They returned to the big stage for the first time in nine years at the 2018 COSAFA Cup, where they managed just a single draw and two defeats to bow out in the first round.

That draw came against Seychelles in their opening game, before they lost to Mozambique (0–3) and Madagascar (0–1).

HISTORY SUMMARY

eSwatini have reached the semifinals of the COSAFA Cup on four occasions, proving their potential for upset results, with their most recent success a bronze medal in 2016. Their last two showings at the COSAFA Cup have resulted in quarterfinal exits though as they lost to Zimbabwe (2017) and Lesotho (2018). Before 1999 they had never won a game in the competition but are now always considered a threat in the COSAFA Cup.

HISTORY SUMMARY

Lesotho have been runners-up in the COSAFA Cup, reaching the final in 2000 when they lost convincingly 6-0 on aggregate to Zimbabwe.

After a period of early exits, fortunes improved in 2013 when they finished fourth in the competition, advancing through the pool stages before losing in the semifinals to Zimbabwe.

They finished fourth again in 2017 and then claimed a bronze medal in Polokwane last year to suggest they will be one of the contenders again this year in Durban.

HISTORY SUMMARY

Malawi have been runners-up in two COSAFA Cup competitions, reaching the final for the first time in 2002 and then making the decider again the following year. Although they were beaten in both legs of the finals by South Africa and Zimbabwe respectively, the Flames have shown they are a side to be reckoned with. Malawi won the COSAFA Cup Plate competition in 2015, but since then have exited the competition in the first round in the last three instalments and will be looking for better this time round.

In 2001, Mauritius did make that stage after beating Namibia and but then lost 1-0 to Angola in Luanda. In 2004 their hopes were dashed in the last eight when they went down 3-1 to Zambia. In 2008 they suffered the indignity of a 7-0 thrashing at the hands of fellow islanders, Seychelles, the biggest defeat in the history of the competition.

After more barren years, they claimed the back-to-back tournaments, beating old foes Zambia on penalties in the final in 2007, and running out victorious in 2008, despite fielding an unofficial 'President's XI' line-up that included players mostly from the second tier of South African football. They regained the title in Namibia in 2016, beating Botswana 3-2 in a thrilling final in Windhoek, and won the plate in 2017 and 2018.

HISTORY SUMMARY

Uganda have long been a power in the East African region and over recent years have seen their fortunes change for the better on the continental stage as well. The Cranes had to wait 39 years between participations at the Africa Cup of Nations finals before their qualification in 2017, and have now made it back-to-back appearances as they go to Egypt as well this year. Uganda have participated at COSAFA events in the past, most recently at the COSAFA Women's Championship in South Africa last year, but also at Under-20 level in the men's competition. The side have not been to the FIFA World Cup in the past, but did come close to qualifying for Russia 2018, with their best showing at the Nations Cup a silver medal in 1978.

They also finished fourth in 1962, but did not make it out of the group stages in their five other showings.

Perhaps their biggest current star is goalkeeper Denis Onyango, who is a CAF Champions League winner with South African side Mamelodi Sundowns.

Uganda's recent form has been good, though they did suffer a surprise 3-0 reversal at the hands of Tanzania in March.

HISTORY SUMMARY

Zimbabwe are record six-time champions in the COSAFA Cup and one of the region's powerhouses. Their last triumph came in 2018 when they beat old foes Zambia 4–2 in a thrilling decider that went to extra-time in Polokwane. It had followed a 3–1 success over the same opposition in the previous year's final, keeping up the rivalry between the two in the COSAFA competition. That started when Zimbabwe won the 2009 trophy by beating Zambia 3–1 in the final, but then lost to Chipolopolo four years later in Ndola as the Zambians claimed a 2–0 final success.

Prior to that they were victorious in 2005 in Mmabatho, again beating Zambia in the final.

10 LEGENDS OF THE COSAFA CUP

Here are 10 players who have lit up the showpiece tournament with their skill and written their names in history.



FABRICE AKWA

► ANGOLA

Akwa was a stalwart of the Angolan side that competed in the early years of the COSAFA Cup, featuring in seven tournaments between 1998 and 2006.

He lifted the trophy twice, in 2001 and 2004, and remains the leading goal-scorer for Palancas Negras in the competition with five.

Akwa was a star striker for Angola at the turn of the century, who turned out for Portuguese giants Benfica, among other overseas clubs. He scored a hat-trick against Mauritius in 2006 to go with goals in 2000 and 2001.

He also scored the winning goals in the qualifiers that sent Angola to their first ever World Cup appearance in Germany 2006, and later played in Qatar before finishing his career with Petro Atlético at home.

He scored 38 goals in 78 international appearances for his country.



TICO-TICO

► MOZAMBIQUE

Manuel José Luís Bucuane, universally known as Tico-Tico, is a former Mozambique international and one of the greatest strikers his country has ever produced.

Tico-Tico played in a record nine COSAFA Cup tournaments over an 11-year period that makes him one of the competition's greats, even if he could never quite steer Mozambique to the coveted title.

He made 22 COSAFA Cup appearances in all, netting eight goals in the process, and became one of the most feared strikers in the competition.

He played for Estrela da Amadora in Portugal before joining South African side Jomo Cosmos for the first of three spells in 1997.

He also played for Tampa Bay Mutiny in the USA, as well as South African PSL clubs SuperSport United, Orlando Pirates and Maritzburg United.



BRIAN BALOYI

► SOUTH AFRICA

Baloyi is a former goalkeeper who was a huge star with South African giants Kaizer Chiefs and Mamelodi Sundowns, as well as the national team.

He won 10 trophies in a glittering club career, but also had 12 years with the South African national side, which included appearances in the COSAFA Cup in 1998, 1999, 2000 and 2005, when he was captain.

Nicknamed 'Spiderman', he was one of the finest keepers of his generation and also won the African Cup Winners' Cup with Chiefs in 2001. He played for AmaKhoshi between 1993 and 2004, before leaving to join rivals Sundowns, where he played until 2010.

"The COSAFA Cup made a huge impact on me in terms of the international exposure I got, and also the chance to captain my country in the competition," Baloyi says.



SIZA DLAMINI

► ESWATINI

Dlamini is a legend in eSwatini and played in a whopping nine COSAFA Cup tournaments between 1997 and 2007, missing out only in 2005 and 2006.

He netted the first goal in a famous 2-0 victory over Zimbabwe in 2002, and later that year also netted against South Africa, though eSwatini lost that game 4-1.

Dlamini also found the back of the net in a 2-0 win over Madagascar the following year.

He made his name at Mbabane Swallows in eSwatini, and played in South Africa for a number of clubs, most notably Lamontville Golden Arrows and Jomo Cosmos.



CONGO HINDJOU

► NAMIBIA

Johannes 'Congo' Hindjou is a hugely respected former Namibia international who played in all of the first six COSAFA Cup tournaments between 1997 and 2003.

The midfielder netted twice in Namibia's first ever appearance in the competition, a 2-1 win over Zimbabwe in 1997, and bagged another that year in a 4-1 success against Malawi.

He was a stalwart of the national side over a number of years and remains one of Namibia's finest ever international players.



ROTSAN KILAMBE

► ZAMBIA

Kilambe played for Zambia at the 1998 and 2000 African Nations Cup finals and would also have a trophy-laden club career at home, in South Africa and China.

He won Man of the Match in his debut in the COSAFA Cup in a 1-0 win over Malawi in 1998, and later grabbed the goal that took Chipolopolo to the trophy win that year against Zimbabwe.

He also bagged a brace and another Man of the Match prize in 2002 in victory over Mozambique.

Kilambe turned out for South African giants Kaizer Chiefs and Mamelodi Sundowns, as well as Bloemfontein Celtic, with who he won the top eight competition.

He was also a Zambia league winner with Zanaco in 2002, the year in which he finished as the league's top-scorer.



PETER NDLOVU

► ZIMBABWE

Ndlovu is the greatest goal-scorer for Zimbabwe in the history of the COSAFA Cup, having netted seven goals during his time in the competition.

Ndlovu always made himself available for the COSAFA Cup despite playing in the big leagues in England and his goals return was impressive, stretching over some seven seasons. His hat-trick in 2004 against eSwatini were the final goals he scored in the regional championship.

He started his career with hometown club Highlanders in Bulawayo, before moving to England with Coventry City. He also played for Birmingham City, Sheffield United and Huddersfield, before returning to Africa to play for Mamelodi Sundowns, where he is currently acting as team manager.



LEHLOHONOLO SEEMA

► LESOTHO

Seema is a former stalwart of the Lesotho national side, who is the current caretaker coach at South African club Bloemfontein Celtic, where he also spent many years as a player.

The defender played in eight COSAFA Cup tournaments between 1998 and 2006, and had a decade in all with the national side.

He played for Chelsea FC, Matlama FC and Bantu FC in Lesotho before winning a move to Celtic in 1998 on the back of his COSAFA Cup showing, and he spent six seasons in the Free State.

He later joined Soweto giants Orlando Pirates, where he played for another five years that included a loan spell with Mpumalanga Black Aces.

"The COSAFA Cup was a great launchpad for my career as it gave me international exposure I never thought was possible," Seema says.



DIPSY SELOLWANE

► BOTSWANA

Selolwane is a legend in Botswana having spent 13 years as a crucial cog in The Zebras midfield.

Having come through the ranks at hometown club Gaborone United, Selolwane moved to Denmark to play for Vejle BK, and then the United States where he represented Chicago Fire and Real Salt Lake in Major League Soccer.

He moved to South Africa in 2005 and was a hit for Santos, Jomo Cosmos, Ajax Cape Town, SuperSport United and the University of Pretoria.

Selolwane featured in six COSAFA Cup tournaments, the first in 1999 and the last in 2006. His debut in the competition saw him score in a 2-1 loss to South Africa.



KERSLEY APPOU

► MAURITIUS

Appou was a stalwart of the early years of the COSAFA Cup with Mauritius, featuring in seven tournaments between 2000 and 2007, when he netted four goals.

No other player has scored more for the island nation in the competition and he was a feared forward in his day.

His international career actually stretched for 15 years as he only retired in 2014, but which time he had become the oldest African player to feature at the highest level when he turned out against Mauritania in an African Nations Cup qualifier at the age of 43 years and 354 days, beating the previous mark set by Cameroon great Roger Milla at the 1994 World Cup.

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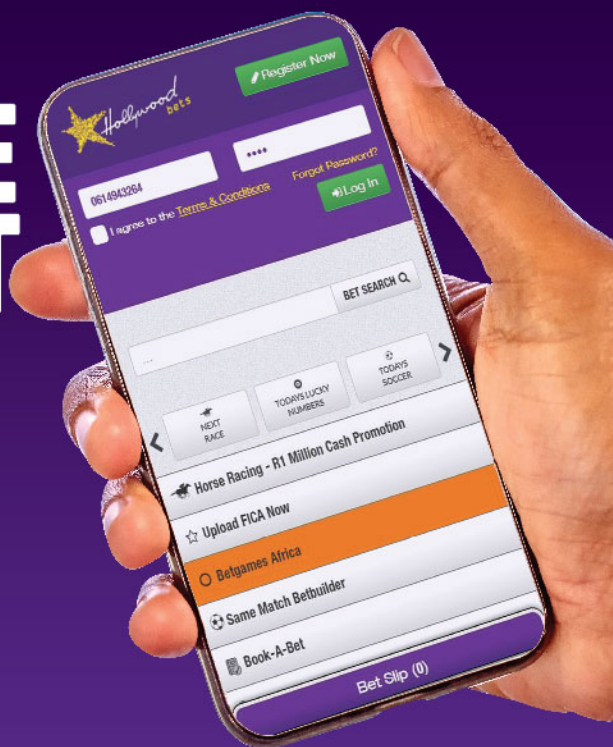
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
